FROM THE PRINCIPAL'S DESK

Term 3 has started with a flurry of activity as we welcome 19 new students to our school. Of these, 9 students from Germany and Italy, commence this term through our international students program. Welcome to all of our new students.

Term 3 has also seen some staff changes. Mr David Henderson (Manual Arts) retired at the end of term 2. His classes will be taken by Mr John Buchanan and Lance Eggert. Welcome to our school. Mr Joe Wright (Agricultural Assistant) has left Education Queensland and is temporarily being replaced by Mr Tony Goodwin, parent and long time supporter of our Agriculture Program. Thanks for taking up the challenge Tony.

This term is particularly busy as it involves much of the planning work for 2007 whilst keeping a focus on classroom activities and performance. Listed below is information on key activities for this term.

Year 12 Queensland Core Skills Test (QCST): This statewide test for Year 12's will take place on 5 and 6 September. Students have been involved in an ongoing preparation program under the guidance of HOD Senior Schooling, Ms Chris Moore. Further details on this test can be found later in this Newsletter.

Year 10 Subject Selection: Our current Year 10 students are the first cohort of students that will be eligible to work towards achieving the new Queensland Certificate of Education. They are currently undertaking their Futures Unit in social education which will culminate in their subject selection for Year 11. Important dates to note are:

- Tuesday 22 August – Year 10 Parent Evening
- Friday 31 August – Year 11 2007 Subject Selection due
- Tues/Wed 12/13 September – Year 10-11 Transition Interviews

Year 8→9 Subject Selection 2007: Our current Year 8 students are our first cohort to undertake our revised Year 9 curriculum in 2007. Information regarding this process will be distributed in the week beginning 4 September with their subject selections due on the last day of this term, 22 September.

Enrolments 2007: Year 8 enrolments for 2007 are well underway with over two thirds of our intended enrolments already completed. If you or someone you know is intending to enrol a student for Year 8 2007, an early enrolment interview is advised.

There are a couple of issues with which I would request parental/caregiver support

- (a) **Deodorant:** Please do not allow students to bring aerosol sprays to school as we have both asthmatic students and students with high level allergies to these products at the school. Aerosol sprays actually put the life of one of our students at risk. If students wish to bring a deodorant to school, they may bring a roll on.
- (b) **Student Footwear:** It is of concern that a small number of students are not meeting Workplace, Health and Safety expectations with respect to footwear. I have attached to this Newsletter a copy of the letter sent to all parents/caregivers in November 2005 regarding this issue. Your support is appreciated.

NEW LAWS FOR CHILD WORKERS

New child employment laws have been created specifically to protect school students from workplace exploitation and to ensure their studies are not adversely affected by work.

Most of the new laws that came into effect from 1 July 2006 relate to school-age children who are under 16 years of age and have not yet completed Year 10.

The laws include a general minimum working age of 13 years (although children 11 years and over can do supervised work delivering newspapers and advertising materials), provisions to limit children's hours of work during school terms, and clarification of employers' obligations to child employees.

ENROL EARLY TO VOTE

The right to vote is one of the most valuable privileges an adult Australian can have.

While you have to be 18 years old to vote, young people don't have to wait until their 18th birthday to enrol. They can enrol anytime after their 17th birthday ensuring they are able to vote in an election the moment they turn 18.

Our democracy requires that all eligible Australians have their say in choosing Parliamentary representatives.

It is compulsory to vote in federal, state and local government elections and those who don't vote can be fined.

Encouraging 17 year olds to enrol ahead of time ensures they avoid any last minute delays and don't incur a fine after they turn 18.

2006 ABS CENSUS

It's Census year again and a Collector from the Australian Bureau of Statistics will soon be knocking on your door.

The fifteenth National Census of Population and Housing will be held on 8 August 2006. To ensure your family doesn't miss out on the important count in Queensland more than 5000 dedicated Collectors will be delivering around 1.7 million Census forms from Cape York all the way to the southern border.

The five yearly Census is the basis for all ABS population figures. It not only counts our population but helps us define who we are as Australians.

It's estimated that data from the Census will be used for determining the distribution of about 40 billion dollars worth of funds.

Census information is used to help determine where such things as number of schools, childcare facilities and hospitals are in your local area.

For the first time this year, it will be possible to fill out a Census form online. The Census contains the latest encryption technology to ensure absolute privacy of all details sent to the ABS.

All information given on the Census form remains private and is not released to anyone outside the ABS. The only exception is if people choose to take part in the "time capsule" project. This special project gives people the option of having their Census forms stored for 99 years in the National Archives. Last Census more than 50% of the Australian population chose to opt into this project and their details are now preserved in the National Archives vault until 2100.

Census forms will be delivered in the days prior to August 8 from July 28 until August. Data collected from the 2006 Census will be released in mid 2007.

Make sure you and your children are counted – their future is in your hands.

SENIOR SCHOOLING NEWS

Queensland Core Skills (QCS) Test

Year 12 students will sit for the QCS test on Tuesday September 5 and Wednesday September 6 – only six weeks away! In preparation for this state wide test, Year 12 students have recently completed a 'practice' test in the Writing Task and Short Response Test Papers. Students will receive feedback on these papers in the next few weeks and will then complete more intensive sessions on aspects identified in this feedback.

Students will receive a letter in the next week, outlining the importance of sitting for the QCS test and the consequences of choosing not to sit the test. Parents need to read the letter carefully before consenting to allow their son/daughter not to sit the test.

ECOMAN

Fourteen of our Year 11 Accounting, BCT and Economics students took part in a business enterprise activity sponsored by the Queensland Private Enterprise Centre. The ECOMAN Program allows students through a simulated computer program to run their own Coffee Machine Companies for a period of four years. As a result, our students were able to put into practice the skills and knowledge they had acquired in their school subjects. Over the three days, our budding entrepreneurs were responsible for running their companies by incorporating marketing, production, accounting and HR skills.

GUIDANCE NEWS

In this term the Year 10's in their SOSE lessons focussing on future pathways and options which includes subject selection for Yr 11 & 12.

To help with their future planning there will be two Information Sessions in August with a variety of guest speakers:- Young Workers Advisory Service – rights and responsibilities as a worker; QUT; Retail Industry; Sports Recreation and Fitness; Aviation Career; Logan TAFE, Southbank TAFE; Manufacturing Careers; Defence Forces, Griffith Uni, School-based Traineeships and Apprenticeships.

Also speaking will be someone from the Australian Taxation Office.

To assist secondary students to obtain a Tax File Number (TFN), students can choose to complete an application through their school.

HEALTH MATTERS

Recently all year 8 & 9 girls were given a brochure on "**Scoliosis or Curvature of the Spine**", as part of a National Self Detection Program for Scoliosis (NSDP).

The program is designed to make parents aware of the outward signs of scoliosis and encourage early detection and intervention if required.

The program is based on girls as 90% of adolescents being treated for scoliosis are girls. If following examination you think that you or your child has this condition then please consult your family doctor.

Why is Early detection important?

In the early stages of scoliosis there are no symptoms. The best way to detect scoliosis is to look for it.

Many young people have very small curves and therefore do not require treatment. However approximately 2% of girls have a curve which warrants medical observation during the growth period and 3 in 1000 girls will require treatment. If treatment is required the earlier it is undertaken, the better the long-term result.

What causes Scoliosis?

The cause is unknown, in fact 80-90% of cases occur in otherwise healthy adolescents. BUT a family history of scoliosis is a definite risk and therefore if a curve is detected in one member of the family, other children should be examined by the family doctor. If there is a history of a blood relative, especially a female cousin, having been treated for scoliosis (by brace or surgery) then it is recommended that a spinal examination becomes regular event.

We do know that scoliosis is not contagious and is not caused by:

- Bad posture
- Soft mattress
- Heavy school bag
- Or junk food

Is treatment successful?

Yes! modern methods produce excellent results when a curve is detected early. In most cases an inconspicuous spinal brace is worn. Occasionally surgery is required.

If left untreated.....

If scoliosis is left untreated the curve may increase in adult life, some may increase during pregnancy. Severe pain, physical deformity and wear and tear arthritis may occur.

Dear Parents/Caregivers

Re: Appropriate Student Footwear

For reasons of work place health and safety requirements, whilst in attendance at school, students are required to wear closed in shoes with non-pervious uppers. i.e. shoes that enclose the entire foot and are made of either leather, vinyl or other impervious material.

It has come to my attention that a few students are wearing shoes to school that are in breach of this requirement and potentially placing their safety at risk when in practical Science, Home Economics, Manual Arts, Health and Physical Education and sports classes. This inappropriate footwear includes:

- Shoes with canvas uppers;
- Shoes that do not cover the bridge (top) of the foot; i.e. open ballet type shoes;
- Shoes without enclosed heels.

When purchasing school shoes for 2006, please ensure that:

- The shoe encloses the entire foot;
- The upper is made of leather, vinyl or some other impervious material (Canvas is not acceptable)

It should also be noted that:

- Plain black shoes are to be worn with the formal uniform;
- Brightly coloured sports shoes do not meet uniform expectations;
- Inappropriately coloured laces do not meet uniform expectations

Plain Black Joggers (Impervious Upper) may be worn with both the formal and the sports uniform.

In the interests of student safety, from 2006, students with footwear that does not meet Workplace Health and Safety requirements will not be able to participate in practical classes in Science, Home Economics, Manual Arts, Health and Physical Education and Sport.
